“ I share the sorrow felt by all over the passing of a magnificent gentleman. I fondly recall Thomas who lived in The Bronx many years ago. He played guitar around the period when I was a student at Elijah D, Clark JHS 149 where Thomas' brother Anthony also attended. Anthony Inzalaco and I were boyhood friends. I recall the Inzalacos lived in the Paterson houses and I lived at 291 E. 143 Street Apt 1D, Bronx. I attended St. Rita's RC Church on College Avenue as a kid. I attended P.S. 18 as a child, then JHS 149. From there I attended Benjamin Franklin H.S. in East Harlem, then on to Andrews University in Berrien Springs, Mich. As a teenager, I played bass guitar at the time, Anthony and I formed a group, the Mystics. Later on, Anthony left the group and went to a more specialized musical group led by Troy. Anthony played a serious lead guitar and was in demand by several musical groups and promoters, he also made an appearance on television as part of a youth musical program on WNJU Ch. 47 in 1966 with that musical rock group. He made the Marginalia page in El Diario a daily newspaper read widely in the Hispanic American community. I recall from my memories that Thomas was always a level headed person. He had a brother who lived in Long Island who took me and Anthony on a day long trip to his house out there. Thomas was a friend of a neighbor of his, Neal Ardolino who was an accomplished bass player with a popular musical rock group of the 1960s-1970s. I remember when Anthony, choking with emotion, gave me the sad news by telephone that his Father had died, it was devastating to me as well.

I last saw Anthony at the Hirsch Pharmacy located on the Grand Concourse in The Bronx many years ago, probably in 1973 or 1974. He was, by that time , engaged to a nice young Lady, and Anthony was living on Villa Avenue. I'm still working and making it through life, in case Anthony reads this. My wife Nellie and I live in a house we own at 1130 Taylor Avenue in The Bronx. So Anthony, if you read this, please know I remember you, Thomas and the whole famiglia. You Mom was a gem and so was your Dad, so was Thomas, God bless them. Take care, Franck LaBoy 718-213-1959 an old friend from The Bronx.
